Sat & Sun, May 20/21. This is a class for intermediate and advanced carvers, 2 days, <u>register here</u>.




Calla Lilly in High Relief

Projects are likely to vary widely so everyone will be exposed to many carving challenges and learn from what others are doing.

Your projects can be whatever your heart desires: maybe an older project you are stuck with, maybe something from her website you want to try, maybe a new technique or an idea for a fresh new project!

If you aren't sure what to work on, Mary and your class coordinators (<u>Heidi, Julie, Michael</u>) are happy to help with ideas. If you want to work on a project from Mary's collection of <u>online lessons</u>, (including the original Gothic Corner Leaf), she will give you free access to the relevant videos before the class so you can prepare.

# Class with Masa Nitani

# How to Carve an Ainu Bear with Masa Nitani - In-person only April 12, 2023, 1 — 5pm. Click here to register

Masa will demonstrate how he carves the Ainu bear, the traditional symbol of his native northern Japan heritage. He mastered bear carving as a teenage apprentice in Sapporo and has carved hundreds. Bears of any size take a long time to carve, so in four hours you will see the process and watch how he approaches the various stages but on a miniature scale. Once a bear is roughed out and refined, its hair is textured. The traditional Ainu bear has a salmon in its mouth and is carved out of one block of wood, with the fish scales added at the end.



# Class with Michael Cullen

## Introduction to Surface Carving APRIL 12, 2023, Click here for details

In this immersive online course, students will learn step-by-step how to enliven their woodworking projects by incorporating hand-carved patterns and textures in their pieces. Instructor Michael Cullen has taught handwork around the world and has a deep background in fine furniture.

Michael will teach you everything you need to know to get started on your carving journey. He'll begin with the essentials: tools and sharpening. He will share his techniques for creating detailed surface patterns and textures that add just the right touch to your work.

Students can choose to carve a ceremonial ladle, tray or a salmon. The essence of the workshop is to experience the use of traditional tribal tools (adze and crooked knife) while working with traditional wood—cedar or alder.











# Sharpening for Beginners — in-person or online

Taught by Roger Crooks, Larry Wade, or Terry Burnside Click a desired date to register, April 12, May 10

One of our main charters is to preserve the art of carving and to do so requires teaching beginners. We all know sharpening is critical. There are many articles and videos online, and they often show contradictory ways to sharpen. For a beginner with few tools, figuring out how to start sharpening is daunting.

Our philosophy is to start with good tools and keep them sharp with stropping. Reshaping tools, power sharpening, and using stones will be taught in future classes.

This beginner's class delivers information with a <u>handout</u>, a <u>video</u>, and hands-on coaching. There is a fine line between getting a sharp edge and rolling over the edge making it duller.



**Leather Strops** 

Correcting stropping techniques in real time will start carvers on the right path to building muscle memory for sharpening. The class repeats monthly, and can be attended either in-person (preferably) or via Zoom.

# Incised Carving Class (free) — in-person, or online

Days and times vary. To register, click on the desired date: April 8

This one-session, 2-1/2 hour class is for those new to carving or who want to try incised carving. This class repeats most months.

The incised style carves lines into the surface of wood and can be done safely with one tool. Students will be provided with Basswood, a loaner tool, patterns, and a carving mat. This workshop will be taught in-person or it can be taken via Zoom.

Students will carve the Dogs Welcome sign shown, and wood is available for a second project afterwards. Students will use a parting (V) tool and can borrow it for a month.

Wood will be provided for this project. As usual, I will bring a few pieces in different stages of completion so you can visualize the process.

Bring your own carving knife and safety gear (like gloves) if you have them. A few gloves and knives will be available for new carvers to try. Our gatherings are always the first Saturday of the month.

If you are a carver and would just like to meet and talk with other carvers, you are welcome to come. Bring your own project to work on and share techniques, interests, and a good time.




Jim Bergeron introduced the high quality video that he produced, which show how he makes adzes. Jim offered commentary and answered questions after the video.

# Attending Monica's Workshop

# Monica Setziol-Phillips Workshop - Possibilities in Carving by Ruth Holland

On the blustery second weekend in March ten carvers of varied skill levels gathered at Kelley Stadelman's studio in North Plains to learn from a true artist: Monica Setziol-Phillips.

Monica is an artist who combines weaving and carving. She learned to carve in her father Leroy Setziol's shop and has been seriously carving since 1986.

She has exhibited her work in galleries around the state and in private collections around the country. Some of her Public Art commissions include Sunriver Lodge, McMinnville Civic Hall, and Salishan Lodge. She's taught carving at Sitka Center for Art and Ecology for 11 years.



Our workshop was designed to give students the opportunity to experiment and expand creative horizons based on explorations of possibilities in wood carving with an emphasis on discovery.

Each student, with their sharpened tools, chose a panel of alder approximately 10" x 16" that had been scored to form a grid. With this grid, students were able to explore alternative inner patterns of their choosing.

Time was then given to ask ourselves what we had to enhance that piece of alder, and what that piece of alder had for us. Monica also showed multiple examples and a range of her own stunning work.

This space for thoughtful contemplation and exploration on what the possibilities are within the wood, within our skillset, and with our tools, was exhilarating. As we worked, Monica walked throughout the studio encouraging each of us and



asking thoughtful questions. One student carved his own hand into a section, several students created intersectional graphic and organic grids, but everyone was thinking both inside and outside the box concurrently (some of us for the very first time).

Each day we had additional time to talk with Monica over a hearty lunch that included a sandwich, soup that Kelley made from scratch, and cookies. Monica brought some cookies she made herself for the second day. I can attest she is an excellent baker!







Monica's class was over all too soon on day two. None of us had finished (not that it was expected), but we'd begun a new way of approaching our craft. Every piece is completely different, as is every student in the class, and every piece of alder.

Many of us had become vested in how each would complete their project, so we're meeting in April via Zoom to see where everyone is and what we've learned.



In a recent email to Monica, I let her know that after two days in her workshop "the craft of carving has become a more mindful/spiritual practice for me. I am listening more intently to the wood and my tools. I am more present in my practice." My skill as a novice carver is comical compared to anything she has done, but I feel the beginning of a magic spark. We are so glad to have had the opportunity to include her in our collective landscape!



### A Memorable Beginning to a Memorable Class

Monica's workshop was unlike any I've taken. It is more mindful, nearly spiritual in nature. She began her class with a quote from Isamu Noguchi, "We are the landscape of all we know," and continued on with the "Story of The Carpenter" by Chinese philosopher Chuang Tzu. BCE 369 to 286 (83 yrs old):

"Once", Chuang Tzu tells us, "there was a master craftsman who made such beautiful things out of wood that the King himself demanded to know the secret of his art.

"Your Highness" said the carpenter,
"there is no secret; but there is
something. This is how I begin: When I am
about to make a table, I first collect my
energies and bring my mind to absolute
quietness. I become oblivious to any
reward to be gained or any fame to
be acquired. When I am free from the
influences of all such outer considerations,
I can listen to the inner voice which tells
me clearly what I have to do.

"When my skill is thus concentrated,
I take up my ax; I make sure that it is
perfectly sharp, that it fits my hand and
swings with my arm. Then I enter the
forest. I look for the right tree: the tree
that is waiting to become my table. And
when I find it, I ask: "What have I for you,
and what have you for me?" Then I cut
down the tree and set to work. I remember
how my masters taught me to bring my
skill and my thought into relation with the
natural qualities of the wood."

The King said, "When the table is finished, it has a magical effect upon me; I cannot treat it as I would any other table. What is the nature of this magic?"

"Your Majesty," said the carpenter, "what you call magic comes only from what I have already told you."

Monica said, "THIS is a tale of collaboration, the craftsman, the tool, the material." That is how we began.







## Using Alcohol Based Leather Stain on Wood by Tom Rich

An experiment to see if alcohol stain could be used on comfort animals to create a variety of looks while using one species of wood.

The Guild has a goal of making 150 comfort birds for the Gathering of the Guilds event in April. Some of the comfort birds and other comfort animals are being made from one species of wood. Someone proposed that we stain them.

First, some of my background: I started woodworking as a hobby by learning to make tobacco smoking pipes from Briar. The Briar shrub is a member of the heather family and is found in the mountains surrounding the Mediterranean Sea. The most prized parts of the Briar bush are the burls, which grow close to the ground and are very hard wood.



It is common for a pipe maker to stain the wood after carving a pipe, before final finishing. The staining enhances the appearance and the subsequent sanding, buffing and waxing. It produces a long lasting, very smooth surface that is comfortable in the hand. These are the attributes we want on the finished comfort animals.



**Example Stains** 

I acquired a piece of <u>Alstonia</u> wood that is being used for many of the comfort birds and did some experimenting with staining it. The stain I selected was an alcohol-based leather dye. It is fast drying and has the advantage of not raising the wood grain, the way a water-based colorant would.

After carving and finish sanding the comfort animal (using 220, 320, 400 then 600 grit), I used a tack cloth to remove all of the sawdust.

I used a semi-soft brush, cloth, or cotton swab to wipe the stain on the comfort animals. Then I let the stain dry for about an hour. Once dry, I sanded lightly with 600 grit sandpaper. Buffing the piece with Tripoli compound using a cotton buffing wheel was next, followed with Aluminum Oxide buffing compound on a second wheel. The final step was to buff the piece with Carnauba wax using a third cotton buffing wheel.

You may also want to try additional procedures for greater effect. Here are some suggestions:

- » Stain and sand several times before buffing and waxing
- » Stain and "wash" the piece with a cloth soaked in alcohol to lighten the stain color.
- » With a very fine brush reinforce the dark ridges—with the same stain or a darker one.
- » Two-color procedure to heighten grain:
  - » Apply black stain first
  - » After the black stain dries, sand all surfaces until only a small amount of black remains in the wood grain
  - » Wipe clean with a clean cloth then apply the color you prefer
- » After each of these procedures, buff and wax your piece as described above






On the piece of Alstonia that I received, I stained a few patches applying the stain directly from the bottle. Then I stained a few patches using the two-color procedure. I first stained the patch with USM Black and let it dry. Then I sanded with 400 then 600 grit sandpaper until black could only be seen in the grain. When the patch was wiped clean, I stained with a color. This was especially good when fairly light stains were used second, allowing the contrast of the black grain with light overcoat.

After final staining, the finishing process is to buff the wood with tripoli compound, then aluminum oxide compound, then apply Carnauba wax, also with a buffing wheel.

After doing the experiments on a piece of wood that was not carved, I repeated the process on a carved comfort bird

My conclusion is that using alcohol based stains could provide pleasing finishes of varying colors on comfort animals while using the same wood. The process can be completed in hours, rather than days, because of the quick drying time of alcohol stain.
