This work is done with a traditional carpenter's chisel (single bevel) rather than a chip carving knife. You will get to try it a little, and we expect he will soon be teaching a class.

Remembering Dennis Mihm

Dennis Mihm, Master Carver by Larry Wade

Dennis lived in South Salem along the Willamette River. He was a founder of Capital Woodcarvers in Salem, but taught widely. He had an MFA degree from Willamette University and was recognized as a Master Carver. He was a gifted carver, artist, instructor, and human being. He inspired many and leaves behind a large body of work that is staggering to behold.

Dennis taught classes in Portland in the early days and was quite well known. We have been given his photo archive and will archive them on our website as one of the *notable carvers* in the area. Jeremy Bailey is scanning and cleaning them up now, but there is no deadline for getting them up, hopefully by the end of the year.

I created a presentation file of the Dennis Mihm pictures that I have and have also uploaded the MP4 to our Google Drive. The link is here. Thanks to his wife Dewilde (recently deceased), and their good friend Nancy Netwal (executor) for making these photos available.

Terry has five chainsaws, some very big, one tiny and batteryoperated. Hmm, do you really know about chainsaws and how they might fit into your work?

\$ Our monthly programs are the second Tuesday of each month from 7:00 - 9:00 pm. They are simultaneously inperson and on Zoom (hybrid), but not held in December or the summer. The in-person site is usually the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers in Multnomah Village at 7634 SW 34th Ave, in the modern Studio classroom on the left side of the complex (mostly on-street parking). All Zoom programs are recorded and posted to our website, and you can see past programs by clicking here, or navigate to Galleries/Video Galleries.

These programs explore the breadth and depth of carving topics and expose us to new ideas, techniques, persons, or resources. While most of us carve wood, it isn't the only material, and occasionally we might consider carving gourds, stone, foam, food, ice, linoleum, etc. Many of us work primarily with gouges, but others work primarily with knives, power carving, or pyrography. For some, carving is one of many hobbies, but for others it is the hobby. Many of us wish we were betters painters, designers, or photographers—better with art as well as craft. Some people like carving big things, tiny things, totem poles, carousel animals, or Japanese netsuke. Some have the patience of Job to carve and paint realistic birds and mammals, while others need to finish projects in hours, not months or years. Spoons anyone?

Sharpening for Beginners — in-person (repeats monthly) Taught by Roger Crooks or Larry Wade

Click one date to register, Oct 11, Nov 8, Jan 10

One of our main charters is to preserve the art of carving and to do so requires teaching beginners. We all know sharpening is critical. There are many articles and videos online, and they often show contradictory ways to sharpen. For a beginner with few tools, figuring out how to start sharpening is daunting.

Our philosophy is to start with good tools and keep them sharp with stropping. Reshaping tools, power sharpening, and using stones will be taught in future classes.

This beginner's class delivers information with a handout, a video, and hands-on coaching. There is a fine line between getting a sharp edge and rolling over the edge making it duller.

Correcting stropping techniques in real time will start carvers on the right path to building muscle memory for sharpening. The class repeats in-person monthly.

Incised Carving Class (free) — **in-person** (repeats monthly)

Days and times vary. To register, click on one desired date: Oct 21, Nov 18, Jan 20

This one-session, 2-1/2 hour class is for those new to carving or who want to try incised carving. This class repeats most months.

The incised style carves lines into the surface of wood and can be done safely with one tool. Students will be provided with basswood, a loaner tool, patterns, and a carving mat. This workshop will be taught in-person or it can be taken via Zoom.

Students will carve the Dogs Welcome sign shown. Wood will be available for a second project once the welcome sign is complete. Students will use a parting (V) tool and can borrow it for a month.

Painting Class for Carvers with Kelley Stadelman — in-person



Do you need help finishing your carvings once it is completed?

Kelley is a skilled painter and carver with a wealth of information about finishing. She can help you learn some techniques through painting that will give your pieces more depth and appeal. "Painting" may mean only mild shading or may lead to adding color. The techniques to achieve a beautiful, finished project can be learned at her upcoming class. The best way to learn is with brush in hand. Learn shading, highlighting, stroke work and other techniques that will help achieve a beautiful, finished carving project.

Each person will attempt, practice and troubleshoot the exercises below in the class. Work sheets will be given out to take home to practice these techniques. The circles show stages of shading around the edges and highlights in the center which make a flat shape look dimensional.

We want to make sure there is enough interest before offering the class. Registering does not commit you, but it allows you to express your preference.

Terry Moss is a skilled caricature carver, and happens to be the president of the Capitol WoodCarvers Club in Salem. In this weekend workshop we will carve the Santa figure. On your own, or in future classes, you can carve the variations shown.

While this Santa design might not be your cup of tea, think of it as a way to get started with caricature carving, a world of its own. For some carvers, it's all they do, and gives them endless choices for artistic expression

The class is intended for beginner and intermediate carvers. The figure is carved out of 2x2x12 basswood which will be roughed out ahead of time so students can concentrate on the essential carving.

Most likely the class will be taught in one of two facilities in North Plains, convenient to Hwy 26.

An Unusual Leroy Setziol

One outcome from Art in the Pearl was the discovery of a unique carving by Leroy Setziol, which is owned by an art dealer family from the 1970s who knew him.

Most of us are familiar with Leroy's large-scale composite pieces, which have been highlighted in this newsletter in months past. This piece is very different.

The owner, Scott Silva, knows Monica Setziol, who said the piece was legitimate. She said it shows his angst as her father parted ways from his ministry work in the east.

Monica also authenticated the carving in writing, including the picture of the carving.

The carving is $24^{\circ} \times 30^{\circ} \times 4^{\circ}$. The frame extends $3 \frac{1}{3}^{\circ}$ from the carving, for an overall size of approximately $32^{\circ} \times 37^{\circ}$.



The sales from carp scales are allocated to Malheur Lake restoration-related programs.


In Case You Missed It...

Using a CNC Machine to Transfer a Carving Pattern by Roger Crooks

In last month's article I explained how I participated in Mary May's workshop. I mentioned using a CNC to get one of Mary's patterns transfered to the wood I was to carve. This article has

more detail on that process.

CNC Machines and Accessories

CNC machines are now priced near \$1000 (minus the router), which includes a sophisticated software program that makes this all work. Building your own CNC can be cheaper but remember you will need to buy the CAD software which can be a significant cost (\$350-\$700 or more).

My small CNC (12" X 12") is a Next Wave Piranha (SD100 now) and came with VCarve, a very popular software design and control software package. While my machine can only cut 12" a time, the software lets you tile your work into 3 files so by moving the board after each pass, you can make a 12" x 36" sign. As you look at larger machines, the price goes up, but for my needs, this has worked great and more importantly for me, takes minimal space.



Small Format CNC Machine

Normally the router is used with a variety of different cutting bits, based on what you are doing. There are two options for non-cutting "bits" that can be used for transferring the pattern: 2 watt laser attachment (\$450) or a drawing pen (\$70). I had the laser attachment (it came free with my machine), so that is what is described here. To be honest, I never had a use for a laser with only 2 watts of power. I will likely not do much with it in the future, but for this application it was great.

Drawing Attachments

The laser attachment replaces the router bit. Rather than cutting the wood, it burns the wood. A 7 watt laser is also available. The 2 watt laser works best for this application but serious burning requires more power. A 7 watt laser will cut into the wood at full power, so you would have to adjust the power settings down to avoid this. If you make a mistake, the low power burn can easily be sanded off with 80 grit sandpaper and you can try again.

The drawing pen works the same way. Insert the attachment into the router and use a pen, pencil, sharpie, etc. One of the advantages of this approach (other than cost) is the ability to add color to the pattern such as for layer definition. You could generate a file for each color and change pens between files.

Note: if is not obvious, you do not have the router on when using either method.

Working with large patterns

For projects that are larger than what your machine will do, VCarve's Tiling Manager lets you split your work into 3 separate operations.

When you generate the control files for the router, it will generate one file per tile. This lets you move the wood to the correct position for Tile 2. It may take some fiddling to be perfect. However, for this application close will be good enough.



VCarve

Working with a CNC machine is 5% hardware, 95% software. VCarve is a powerful program, but it is easy to start doing basic projects. There are also great training videos online. Being so popular, lots of help locally is available, especially with the Guild of Oregon Woodworker's CNC group.

Graphics

VCarve will take a vector file (.pdf, .ai, .eps and other CAD design software files) or a bitmap file (.bmp, .gif, .jpeg, .tif, .png) and generate the code to control the CNC machine. The CNC control software requires a vector file to move the router to draw the image. If you do not have a vector file, VCarve will convert a bitmap file into vectors. You can then edit the resulting file as needed by drawing in additional features. You can also easily resize the pattern, as needed. In this case I increased the size to 150% of the original.




Original Graphic

On the left was the original JPEG file that was imported into VCarve.

On the right, I then added lines to make the barn look like a log cabin.

This file was then used to burn the image on the carving blank (left) with the laser attachment.



The VCarve file then burns the image onto the wood blank. It just burns the surface of the wood that can easily be sanded off with 80 grit sandpaper. The finished piece is below.

Celtic Dragon by Tom Siep

Following on from Roger Crooks' article, I decided to explain how I developed and transferred a pattern without using my CNC to get it on the wood. If I had the laser that Roger has, I guess I could have burned the pattern directly, but the laser does not have the fine control of a woodburning tip. Besides—that would be cheating.

I started my woodburning project with a JPEG, just as Roger did with his carving. I also imported that JPEG into the same CNC program, VCarve. The reason was that VCarve does an adequate job of changing pixel art (dots on the screen) into vector art (resolution-independent lines). However, where VCarve shines is how it enables editing vectors.

The original drawing of the dragon was not (IMO) very carefully done, so I used the original graphic as a rough guide and redrew the dragon so that the tendrils were better spaced and aligned as they crossed under the body. I also omitted the scales and the carrot-like things hanging off the head and tail.

Once I had the redraw done, I laser-printed the dragon onto velum. I then transferred the laser pigment to a basswood board with a small iron.

After the very slow process of heating the velum enough to loosen and transfer the pigments, I outlined the dragon by following those very faint impressions.

When the outlining was complete, I filled the body with feather/scales and shaded the body to show light coming from below. I used the air filter system I wrote about in a <u>previous issue</u> of the <u>newsletter</u> to avoid breathing too much smoke.
