He helped get the Columbia Flyway Show going as well as his wife, who was a bird carver.











Andy Anderson was well known as a fish carver, although he always carved his family a Santa every year. He also participated in a number of wildlife classes. He taught several fish carving classes in his garage to all skill levels. I took a Rainbow Trout Fish class, and he patiently helped me get it done. He never let me forget that I called the fins the front feet and back feet. He laughed with me about that many times. He and his wife Christine were very active in Coastal Carvers and Andy was active in the Portland and Salem Clubs over the years.



He also won awards for his carvings across the US. He an avid supporter of beginning carvers with

encouragement and generosity of sharing his knowledge. His attitude that everyone feel welcome no matter what their skill level was.

Our monthly programs are the second Tuesday of each month from 7:00 - 9:00 pm. All Zoom programs are recorded and posted to our website, and you can see past programs by clicking here, or navigate to Galleries/Video Galleries.

These programs explore the breadth and depth of carving topics and expose us to new ideas, techniques, persons, or resources. While most of us carve wood, it isn't the only material we use. Occasionally we might consider carving gourds, stone, foam, food, ice, linoleum, and whatever else will carve.

Many of us work primarily with gouges, but others work primarily with knives, power carving, or pyrography. For some, carving is one of many hobbies, but for others it is the hobby. Many of us wish we were betters painters, designers, or photographers-better with art as well as craft. Some people like carving big things, tiny things, totem poles, carousel animals, or Japanese netsuke. Some have the patience of Job to carve and paint realistic birds and mammals, while others need to finish projects in hours, not months or years. Spoons anyone? 

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Monthly Classes & SIGs

### Sharpening for Beginners — in-person (repeats monthly) Taught by Roger Crooks or Larry Wade

Click one date to register, <u>Nov 8, Jan 10</u>

One of our main charters is to preserve the art of carving and to do so requires teaching beginners. We all know sharpening is critical. There are many articles and videos online, and they often show contradictory ways to sharpen. For a beginner with few tools, figuring out how to start sharpening is daunting.

Our philosophy is to start with good tools and keep them sharp with stropping. Reshaping tools, power sharpening, and using stones will be taught in future classes.

This beginner's class delivers information with a <u>handout</u>, a <u>video</u>, and hands-on coaching. There is a fine line between getting a sharp edge and rolling over the edge making it duller.



Leather Strops

Correcting stropping techniques in real time will start carvers on the right path to building muscle memory for sharpening. The class repeats in-person monthly.

### **Incised Carving Class (free)** – **in-person** (repeats monthly)

Days and times vary. To register, click on one desired date: <u>Nov 18, Jan 20</u>

This one-session, 2-1/2 hour class is for those new to carving or who want to try incised carving. This class repeats most months.

The incised style carves lines into the surface of wood and can be done safely with one tool. Students will be provided with basswood, a loaner tool, patterns, and a carving mat. This workshop will be taught in-person or it can be taken via Zoom.

Students will carve the Dogs Welcome sign shown. Wood will be available for a second project if you want. Students will use a palm handled parting (V) tool and can borrow it for a month.

### Caricature Carving with Terry Moss – in-person

Weekend session, Nov 11/12. To register, <u>click here</u>. We want to make sure there is enough interest before offering the class. Registering does not commit you, but it allows you to express your preference.

Terry Moss is a skilled caricature carver, and happens to be the president of the Capitol Woodcarvers Club in Salem. In this weekend workshop, we will carve the Santa figure. On your own, or in future classes, you can carve the variations shown.

While this Santa design might not be your cup of tea, think of it as a way to get started with caricature carving, a world of its own. For some carvers, it's all they do, and gives them endless choices for artistic expression

The class is intended for beginner and intermediate carvers. The figure is carved out of 2x2x12 basswood which will be roughed out ahead of time so students can concentrate on the essential carving.

Most likely the class will be taught in one of two facilities in North Plains, convenient to Hwy 26.

### **Carving by Clark Moss**

Here's a tiki mask box lid I made for my son's 11th birthday in September.

It's about 4.5"x7" in bass wood.

The background was stained with Minwax - wiped on, left for a minute or two before wiping off.

The mask was antiqued first with a coat of shellac, then Minwax stain wiped on and immediately wiped off. Then both the mask and background got 4-5 costs off shellac.

The box was made with some old red oak barn wood, which explains all the nail holes.

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### Afghanistan Style Chip Carving

#### by Ahmed Rauofi

The Oct Carving SIG meetings focused on the topic of Afghanistan Style Chip Carving, which was demonstrated by Ahmed Rauofi, a 27 year old relatively recent arrival to Portland and to America.

Ahmed studied woodworking and carving for three full years in Kabul where he learned a wide variety of skills.



The technique uses just one mid-size carpenter's chisel, single bevel, held



mostly vertically. This style is also known as Nuristani Chip Carving, named after the province in the eastern part of the country. The carved forms are typically geometric but are a variety of straight and curved lines, where the patterns are typically drawn with a compass and ruler right on the wood.

The photo of the wood plate is one he carved on one he recently bought at a discount at Ross for Less.

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### **Tool Holder & Carving Platforms**

### Tri-Level Carving Tool Holder & Carving Platforms

As you build your collection of tools, managing them on a project can be a challenge. You can find yourself spending more time on finding the right tool for a special cut than you do using it. My solution to this problem takes very minimal bench space; it is a tri-level tool holder.

The lowest level of the tool holder is for small tools, knives, pencils, and the like. I have a set of holes for Dockyard miniature gouges. The rest of the holes are for palm tools or knives.

Level 2 and 3 are for full-size tools. Level 2 has 11 holes that are  $\frac{3}{4}$ " diameter. I arrange my gouges with V-gouges on the left. On the right, I arrange my gouges by profile (2, 3, 5, 7...) and within each profile, by widths from 3 mm to about 15 mm.

For larger widths, level 3 has four 1" holes and the rest are  $\frac{3}{4}$ " holes.

Ideally, you would return the tool to the holder after use. However, in practice, I find myself not doing so until I have 3-5 tools on the bench.

### **Specifications for the Holder**

Level 1 is 1.5" wide and level 2 and 3 are 2" wide.

Height Level 1 = 3.5" Level 2 = 6" Level 3 = 8.5"

Shelves Level 1 = 1.5" x 15" Level 2 = 2" x 15" Level 3 = 2" x 15"

5.5"

Depth

The three levels are screwed together so the holder is one unit making it easy to move around.

Obviously, you would size the holes and heights to meet your needs.

BTW, I started with just level 1 and 2 and easily added level 3 so you could add level 4 and 5 if needed.

### Workspace

If you need a holder for your carving or need to raise your carving surface, I use the Sjobergs Smart Workstation Pro Vise on top of my workbench. It's 21" x 15". It makes it easy to reposition my carvings as needed plus it takes minimal space.

I also have a portable light (on the right) for lighting. My strop is just to the right (not shown) so I can quickly touch up tools as needed.











#### **Bench Hook Carving Platform**

For my first carving platform and subsequent smaller projects, I made this bench hook below.

This is a bench-hook-type design that is used for small projects. Along the left and top are shelves for holding my tools. The middle cross bar with notches is for holding the workpiece at different angles as needed. It is also removable with two screws.

I find I use the space above the cross bar to hold other things such as a drawing, markers, or other items I am using.

My strop is easily available on the right.

This is especially useful for palm tools as they can easily pile up as you are using them. The holes can also be used for knives.

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### The Sitka Art Invitational and a Bit More

The Sitka Center for Art and Ecology is a non-profit located in an idyllic forested setting a short walk from the

dramatic Cascade Head on the Oregon Coast just north of Lincoln City. Sitka hosts dozens of artists (and some scientists) each year who practice their art and offer courses. The center has a number of studios, a comfortable library, and rooms and cottages for artists in residence. Even if there are no classes when you visit, walk



around and enjoy the peaceful serenity of the campus.

This 29th year of the Sitka Art Invitational was held at <u>Oregon Contemporary</u> in the Kenton neighborhood of north Portland from October 13-15. Never been to the Kenton neighborhood? Its most prominent landmark is this 1959 carving of Paul Bunyan from a giant Sequoia tree. Note the pedestrian to the right who would barely come up to the bottom of Paul's trousers!



Well, did you fall for the Sequoia ruse?!? If so, you've been tricked! Because you didn't give me a treat this past Halloween as I am drafting this piece! Of the 300 works on display, relatively few were carvings, and somewhat fewer are shown.

### John Strohbehn john-strohbehn.squarespace.com

Originally from the Palouse Hills of Eastern Washington, John Strohbehn is a Pacific Northwest sculpture artist . He is inspired by natural pieces of wood and stone, cutting through

the layers searching for form to compliment the material. He wants his pieces to invite the viewer into a visual meditation.

*Sail* is carved from jacaranda wood that has been bleached and is on a carved stone base. It it 51″ high. It was marked as sold for \$5,500.



*Mycelial Gown* was carved from yellow cedar with a milk paint patina. It is 32" high and listed for \$4,600



*Fernball* is about 9" in diameter and is carved from red cedar and douglas fir. The asking price was \$3,000.







### John and Robin Gumaelius waterworksgallery.com/artists/29-robin-and-john-gumaelius

John and Robert Gumaelius collaborate to make whimsical characters mostly from ceramics and wire. This show featured their somewhat less whimsical (compared to their ceramic and wire creatures) carvings from old growth western red cedar. They come from a family of story tellers, live on 20 acres, have a garden, and feel somewhat tribal with the benefits of living in an industrial time and place. Their collaborative art feels ceremonial and conversational.



The 35"x34" Pelican Mask was listed at \$2,400.



The 23" x 19" Bear mask sold for \$2,400.



The 4'tall *Fox Totem Mask* sold for \$3,600.

#### Stan Peterson www.stan-peterson.com

Stan Peterson divides his time between Oregon and New Mexico. He is always on the lookout for moments of significance which tell a story. Do you see a story in these carved basswood figures?

### Deborah Unger www.deborahungerart.com

Deborah Unger is a native Oregonian. She generally carves a figure and then makes patterns, sews and applies the garments.

The Hand of Daphne is carved wood. To avoid weak cross-grain in the leaf stem, the leaves must have been carved separately and applied. It sold for \$1,000. I didn't get the name/price of the full body Daphne. Note how the feet are "rooted" to the earth.





*Misfit* is crafted from wood, textile and a steel base. Note the 'feet'...it took me a while.

#### Laura Buchan Laurabuchan.com

Originally from Montana, Laura Buchan lives in Portland. She focuses on sculpture and primarily investigates forms found in nature and anatomy. Her works are not meant to emulate a specific thing, but rather are amalgams that can be interpreted in different ways, often walking the line between fantastic and realistic. She roughs out her work on a band saw and carves using angle and die grinders.

Residuun 7 is carved cherry, about 7"x10"x13".









Monica Setziol-Phillips See the <u>March 2023 Newsletter</u> for several examples of her work. Having taught a class and being featured in articles, Monica is quite familiar to the OCG.

Monica started in the fiber arts and subsequently was inspired by her father Leroy Setziol and started carving in the 1980s.



*Pillar Talk No.1* and *Pillar Talk No.2* were carved from 3.5 in sq. x 26" yellow cedar and were offered at \$700 each.



*Almost Sunset* is a 1x2 ft piece of carved mahogany with a band of woven fabric. It sold for \$2,200.

#### Thomas Rude thomasrude.com

Thomas Rude has carved an impressive array of whimsical scenes and creatures from many materials. He agonizes over or accidentally stumbles upon many of the media he uses.

To me, it is often surprising what comes flapping or oozing out and what remains persistently elusive.

Seeing Eye to Eye is 10x16", offered for \$575, and was quite "normal" compared to many other works on his website.



#### More Kenton Neighborhood Art

After the exhibit my wife and I walked a block to wander the couple block long Kenton commercial strip, enjoyed a great bakery and the shop of a CNC artist. We then walked another block to a favorite bamboo plant nursery and home-goods shop featuring local artisans and many crafts and carvings from Indonesia. Here are several extraordinary carvings at the Bamboo Craftsman (<u>bamboocraftsman.com</u>). The still-crated *River Goddess*—offered for \$9,000—was from the root of an ancient Lychee tree. The twin goddess carving and the dragon carving are both from the root of coffee trees that are past their peak coffee cherry production years.





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Jeremy Bailey (our club secretary) led a program that focused on creating great photos of your carvings. He conceded that having the right camera is a good start, but part of the equation also includes:

- » Composition and setup
- » Understanding lighting
- » Backdrops
- » Photo corrections

Jeremy shared his experiences from working in the trade. There are lots

of resources out there (<u>see</u> <u>Woodcarving Illustrated</u>), but putting them into practice is another thing. Jeremy had some great practical pointers to enable us to take better—maybe even great—photos of our work.
